Sometimes we have to apologize for the clutter at our museum because when we organized in 2001 and bought an old stone house, we

had no idea how many things local families and businesses would bring to us to help preserve our history! Now we need a larger museum, to do justice to the displays we want to set up, and the information we need to organize and have available for research. Our town and the surrounding area are unique, and their stories should not be lost.

You could say we've become the town's attic, but that would just be part of the picture. Our organization has published a number of excellent books, containing information you won't find anywhere else. Some of those are "best sellers" that have had to be printed again and again. We also inherited 100 years of the bound volumes of The Hamburg Item, which is like a time machine when you page through them. We put out a popular Newsletter four times a year, mailed to our members.

Our members believe in this, and have contributed to our building fund, and we hold fund-raisers too, but we'll need the help of the whole community to achieve



this. We bought a building lot at 4th and Franklin, unfortunately just before the COVID pandemic hit, bringing things to a halt for a while. But now we are determined to see this new building take

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

What is Emergency Management?

When you hear the term Emergency Management, you may picture someone directing things during a catastrophe or someone on the phone trying to get supplies. While these are possible duties of an Emergency Management Coordinator, they are far from the only duties and far from the norm.

Emergency Management starts long before the emergency exists. There has been planning, along with municipal officials, to deal with problems before they crop up. There have been emergency plans developed to deal with hazards particular to a jurisdiction. Here in North Berks County, our biggest concerns are flooding and winter weather.

With the presence of the interstate, winter weather is always a concern. What do we do if the highway is shut down or people get stranded on the highway? There is a plan for that. What about a chemical spill on the highway? There is a plan for that. The best way to deal with an emergency is to be prepared.

These things are all important, but maybe the most important part of emergency management is the recovery. A state or federal disaster declaration brings with it help for residents and businesses in the form of low-interest loans or possibly grants to help restore properties or, if the damage is bad enough, to rebuild. Your Emergency Management Coordinator's job is to document the damage and work with the county Department of Emergency Services and local officials to secure the assistance residents and businesses need.

If you have emergency-related damage and are not contacted by EMA personnel, contact your local government officials and tell them you need help. Your local emergency management officials are happy to help.

HAMBURG BOROUGH COLLECTION CALENDAR

Trash Collection

Residents are reminded that there is a four (4) bag limit per household. Trash and recycling are not to be placed out for collection earlier than 6:00 p.m. the evening before scheduled collection date.

Single-Stream Recycling Collection

Hamburg Borough offers "single-stream" recycling program which makes it easier than ever to recycle. Thanks to new technology, everything that your household recycles will now go in the same container. No need to separate your papers, metals, cardboard, glass and plastics, etc. J. P. Mascaro & Sons will pick up recyclables every week on Tuesday with a truck that resembles a trash truck. The collection truck has a compactor, so more recycling material will fit in allowing for more efficiency.

Whenever a fifth Tuesday falls within a month, there will be no recycling collection that week.

What Can be placed out as Recyclables?

- Paper and Cardboard (no books, no contaminated pizza boxes)
- Wax Cartons: Milk, juice, soup, flavored drinks and cartons can be recycled.
- Aluminum
- Glass (no window glass, mirrors or light bulbs)
- Plastics #1- #7 (no toys, styrofoam or ceramics)

Yard waste collected April 1 through December 3rd.

Yard Waste

Collection in open containers or compostable bags. No plastic bags! Saturdays in 2023 (4/1 - 12/2)

Bulk Item Collection

One (1) bulk item collected once a month. Bulk items will be collected on a Tuesday along with normal collection on the second full week of every month.

E-Waste Alert! Disposal Ban:

Solid waste disposal facilities in Pennsylvania are no longer allowed to accept covered devices such as televisions and computer devices including hard drives, monitors, keyboards, mice and

printers or their components.

Holiday Schedule:

On holiday weeks, if pickup falls on or after the day of the holiday there is a one (1) day delay.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

When do I need a permit?

That is a question many people ask when it comes to doing work around their homes. There are multiple types of permits issued by the Borough. The Borough issues building, mechanical (HVAC), plumbing, and electrical permits. We also issue other permits that can be issued as a standalone permit or issued in conjunction with other permits. They can include zoning, sidewalk, driveway, and dumpster permits to name a few. Below are some examples of projects that do and do not require permits, but to be safe, it is always best to contact the building department before starting any project.

Common Projects that DO require permits:

- Most commercial
- Deck
- Addition
- Remodel
- Demolition (partial or total)
- Sidewalk or driveway work
- Mechanical system or component repair/replacement
- Water service line repair/replacement
- Sewer lateral repair/replacement

Selling a property?

Every property to be sold within the Borough is required to have a property transfer inspection conducted prior to its sale. These inspections mainly look for life safety items, for example, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI's), etc.

Grass, weeds, and other vegetation

Chapter 10 of the Borough Code states that no person owning or occupying any property in the Borough of Hamburg shall permit any grass or weeds or any vegetation whatsoever, not edible or planted for a useful or ornamental purpose, to grow or remain upon such premises so as to exceed a height of 12 inches. Please do your part and maintain your property within Borough Code.

Swimming Pools

Any swimming pool, spa, or aquatic recreation facility connected to a circulation system or over 24 inches in height and 5,000 gallons must comply with the 2018 International Swimming Pool and Spa Code. This includes inflatable pools. Included in the International Swimming Pool and Spa Code is the requirement to have an approved barrier around any pool. The barrier must be at least 48 inches in height. Please contact the Building Department before installing any type of pool.

Dumpster Permits

With springtime fast approaching, many are itching to get some spring cleaning done. If your spring cleaning requires a dumpster, please note that Borough Code requires a permit for any dumpster or storage container that will be in place for more than 24 hours on private or public property.

Helpful Programs

Major Systems Program

The Berks County Redevelopment Authority is administering the Major Systems Program which is designed to assist low-income families who own and occupy an attached or detached single-family home in need of a repair or replacement of a major system of their house. This assistance is in the form of a one-time deferred payment loan and must be used for an item or items that threaten the health, safety, and welfare of the household. Please contact the Building Department if you have any questions.

USDA Single Family Housing Repair Loans and Grants

Also known as the Section 504 Home Repair program, it provides loans to very-low-income homeowners to repair, improve, or modernize their homes, or provides grants to elderly, very-low-income homeowners to remove health and safety hazards. Please contact the Building Department if you have any questions.

Common Projects that usually DO NOT require permits:

- Roof replacement (non-structural)
- Replacement of vinyl or aluminum siding
- Replacement of doors and windows (as long as you do not change the opening size)

- Replacing kitchen cabinets or countertops

HAMBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT

Greetings to All that receive this newsletter. I am honored to have the Hamburg Borough Police Department featured and recognized in this correspondence.

I would like to share a little bit of information about the Hamburg Police Department.

The Hamburg Borough Police Department is one of the oldest law enforcement agencies in Berks County, second only to the Berks County Sheriffs' Department.

Hamburg Police was created in 1846 by an ordinance enacted by the Borough Council of Hamburg.

Two Officers of the Hamburg Police Department in the history of the agency gave their lives in the performance of their duties. Both officers are recognized and permanently honored on the Police Officer's Memorial in Washington DC. One of the officers died in a gun battle with robbery suspects, and the other officer died as a result of taking into custody a wanted person.

The Hamburg Police Department is a full-service law enforcement agency. The agency is headed by a Chief of Police who reports to the Mayor of Hamburg, and the operations are supervised by two Corporals. The department operates 24 hours a day and seven days per week.

Officers of Hamburg Police receive specific training on criminal investigations, motor carrier enforcement, advanced accident investigation and reconstruction, and conducting drug and dangerous narcotic trafficking investigations. Officers regularly participate in law enforcement initiatives involving enforcement of DUI laws and motor carrier safety compliance. The Hamburg Police Department

participates in the Berks County District Attorney's Office Drug Task Force and one officer from the agency is cross-sworn as a Berks County Detective.

We have a close relationship with the Hamburg Area School District and work with their administrators to ensure a safe learning environment for the students. Recently HPD officers and the Pennsylvania State Police partnered on March 2, 2023 on Reading Across America to visit the elementary schools and read to the students at schools in the Hamburg region. Officers provide police services to the School District on an as-needed basis for major events and other matters that require extended police presence. Officers are regularly patrolling the schools as part of their assigned duties.



Aside from patrolling in "town," officers are responsible for policing the Hamburg Watershed. For these tasks, the officers use an off-road UTV to negotiate the rugged terrain of sections of the Watershed that encompass sections of the Appalachian Trail. Officers have responded to calls of lost hikers, hunters, individuals in need of first-aid and other calls for service. Officers work with the Pennsylvania Game Commission in enforcement of rules and regulations as well as state game laws.

Current Initiatives of the Police Department:

Continued participation in Traffic Safety Programs to include enforcement and safety education.

Bike Patrol Operations- In the spring, summer and fall, officers will be regularly patrolling the business districts of the Borough as well as conducting safety programs for new and younger bicycle riders. This program is in cooperation with the Berks County AAA.

Vacation Checks- Are you away on vacation? Contact the police station or stop in; officers will check your residence daily as part of their patrol operations.

Business Checks- Officers on the overnight shift regularly make patrol checks of closed businesses. If you are a business owner, you probably found the Orange card left by an officer stating that your facility was checked.

Crime Alert-Berks County- Know of a crime or of a wanted person, call the hotline 1-877-373-9913 or text ALERTBERKS at 84711 with a crime tip. Hamburg Police are advocates and a participating agency. Crime Alert is the #1 Crime Stopper program in Pennsylvania. All calls are anonymous and if the tip works out, you may get a cash reward.

Traffic Safety is a big concern within Hamburg. If you have a matter that you feel needs to be brought to our attention, please let us know, email the Chief of Police directly at akuklinski.hpd@hamburgboro.com., or (610) 655-4911. Officers are regularly assigned to conduct traffic enforcement details to deter careless and reckless driving incidents.

Motor Carrier Enforcement: Anyone familiar with Hamburg knows that commercial trucks have an impact on the safety of the region. HPD employs officers that are specifically trained in weights and measures, and motor carrier safety. These are integral parts of our enforcement and safety program. Officers regularly conduct details locally and regionally to help deter incidents involving motor carriers.

Police Accreditation: The Hamburg Police Department is in the process of attaining independent accreditation from the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. This initiative analyzes and assesses over 120 segments of operations of the agency. The accreditation holds the agency and the officers to higher professional standards.

Training: Officers continue their education to keep their skills at a high level of proficiency. Our goal is to provide a high level of professional police service.

This is a short list of things we are doing to enhance our community involvement and to keep our community safe.

Officers issued 685 parking tickets, 978 traffic citations, issued 36 police warning notices

Officers arrested 21 DUI Drivers- issued 76 non-traffic citations, made 36 juvenile arrests that led to referral to the juvenile probation office for disposition, and filed 96 criminal cases.

In closing, the Hamburg Police Department is here to serve the Hamburg Community, we regularly post activities on our social media, specifically Facebook and we use social media as an outreach tool to the community. HAMBURG NATIONAL WILDLIFE HABITAT COMMITTEE

The mission of the Hamburg National Wildlife Habitat Committee is to educate citizens and businesses in the Hamburg area about the benefits of planting native plants and encourage them to certify their yard, container garden, or work landscape through the National Wildlife Federation. Through their efforts, Hamburg was the first community in Pennsylvania to be designated as a Wildlife Habitat Garden Community by the National Wildlife Federation.

Working cooperatively, the Habitat Committee, the Rotary Club of Hamburg and Helping Hands Satellite Club, and Blue Mountain Wildlife Inc. provide activities and educational events for the community by sponsoring Earth Day Clean-Up, History Hikes, workshops such as Bees in Our World and Wildflower Walks, cleaning and painting the fountain at the Hamburg borough building and erecting a gazebo at the Kernsville Dam parking area.

Do you plant with a purpose—with wildlife in mind? Have you thought about increasing the habitat found at school or in your backyard to attract more birds, bees, and butterflies? encouraging people at home, school, and in their community to create habitat that provides food, water, cover, and places to raise young while also incorporating sustainable practices?

Native plants are those that have formed tight relationships with wildlife over thousands of years and create the most productive and sustainable place for wildlife to live. But they need a helping hand. Change is more than possible. Keystone plants are natives that support 90% of butterflies, moths, and up to 60% of native bees in a specific ecoregion. Much of this wildlife is also responsible for supporting over three-quarters of all flowering plants, thanks to their pollination powers. The plants they support provide a third of the food we eat.

The Habitat Committee has established three kiosks with small native plant gardens surrounding them throughout Hamburg and tries to maintain these kiosks throughout the growing season. One of these kiosks is at the southern end of the public park along the Schuylkill River. In addition, the Rotary Club of Hamburg has planted native plants at the Kernsville Dam area. The Habitat Committee is looking for volunteers to help maintain these small gardens and to help with other projects that may arise.

For the past eleven years, the Habitat Committee has held a garden tour of backyard habitats in the Hamburg area. The backyard habitats, both large and small, include food, water, ground cover or shelter, and a place for wildlife to raise their young. Each of the participants in the tour receives a map of the tour and an informational booklet. All of the proceeds from this tour are going back to the committee for future educational projects. The Habitat Committee is currently looking for community members in the Hamburg Area to participate in this year's tour, which is being held on Saturday, June 24th. Our Town Foundation - Celebrating 20 Years!

Our Town Foundation, Hamburg's non-profit community revitalization organization, is celebrating its 20th anniversary!

The organization was formed in 2001, incorporated in 2002 and was designated as an official downtown Main Street by the PA Dept. of Community and Economic Development

office in 2003. Deena Kershner was hired as the first Main Street Manager and has served in that role ever since.

During the past 20 years, the Hamburg area has witnessed many changes, not just in the downtown business district, but in the surrounding townships as well. Tilden Township exploded with retail development after the arrival of Cabela's. More recently, large warehouses sprouted up in neighboring communities along the I78 and Route 61 corridors providing employment opportunities for many. While the landscape of the surrounding area has changed, downtown Hamburg has remained constant as a nostalgic downtown shopping center offering unique retail boutiques and service-oriented businesses.

Over the past 20 years, Our Town Foundation has worked feverishly to revitalize the downtown and has received over \$4,000,000 in grant funding in support of its efforts. Some of the organization's major accomplishments include a downtown streetscape improvement project, providing financial assistance for numerous façade renovations within the downtown business district, improving three municipal parking lots, riverfront improvements, including the creation of new walking paths with links to existing trails, and partnering with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Pittsburgh and the Berks County Redevelopment office in providing financial assistance to low and moderate-income homeowners for property repairs and improvements.

The Foundation continually promotes downtown Hamburg and the surrounding area to encourage residents and visitors to shop, dine and enjoy our many outdoor natural resources. Over the years, several brochures and rack cards have been created by the Foundation, including the Historic Hamburg Visitors Guides, which are distributed throughout the state via the PA Welcome Centers located at rest stops along the highways. The hamburgpa. org website, which is maintained by the Foundation, provides information on

all the Hamburg businesses and attractions, serving as an online directory of local resources. In 2022, the organization created a one-minute commercial to promote the Borough, its downtown businesses, recreational opportunities, and charm.

The organization has organized and hosted many events over the years, the most notable being the annual Taste of Hamburg-er Festival. This year, the festival is also celebrating its 20th anniversary! This signature event, which attracts thousands of people downtown, has become a homecoming day for families and friends. The event supports a broad range of stakeholders within the community while serving as a major fundraiser for the organization.

In 2006 the Foundation formed the Hamburg Area Arts Alliance to support and showcase local artists and to advance the awareness of arts in the community. Since its inception, the Alliance has faithfully adhered to its mission by offering many arts-related programs and activities for the community, including the opening of the Art & Craft Gallery of Hamburg, where local artists can display and sell their artwork, the creation of a public arts initiative with the addition of four large painted murals and several smaller ones in the downtown, offering art classes, hosting arts related festivals and First Friday Art Strolls, and organizing the "Artdrenaline" three-day camp for youth.

In 2013 the Foundation purchased the Hamburg Strand Theater to save it from its demise and has since made over \$260,000 in improvements making it one of the favorite places in Berks County to see a first-run movie. During the first year of ownership, the projection system was converted to digital, and a Dolby surround sound system was installed. Without the conversion, the film companies would no longer allow first-run movies to be shown. Even though the cost exceeded \$60,000, it was the first priority of the organization to complete this upgrade. During the early years of ownership, the roof was completely replaced, and two additional bathrooms were constructed on the main floor. Additional repairs included refurbishing the historic marquee, new HVAC equipment, energy-efficient lighting upgrades, exterior brick repairs, replacing the stage flooring, and painting. In 2022, new carpeting was laid in the lobby and auditorium, and six ultraviolet disinfecting lights were installed to ensure the health and safety of the patrons.

In 2015 the organization purchased a vacant one-acre lot located within the downtown Main St. corridor with the intent of developing the lot into an outdoor community hub where special events and activities will be held. A parking lot was recently constructed in the rear of the property, and plans to build a facility with a stage, concession area, and public restrooms are in the works.

The organization would like to extend its gratitude to all of its volunteers, staff, financial supporters, and members that have shown their support over these memorable years. Even though there is still plenty to do for the community, Our Town Foundation is proud of what it has achieved over the past twenty years and looks forward to many more prosperous years in Hamburg.
